Future knowledge: The ability to analyse non-fiction texts is a life skill that students will apply to their mock exams and actual GCSE exams but will also provide them with a clear and strategic way of reducing texts to their separate parts.	Future knowledge: As well as understanding the poetic techniques that have been used to convey meaning in poems, students will spend time placing the poems in their contexts and therefore deepening their understanding of a range of situations and conflicts over time.	Future knowledge: Students will be using the feedback from their exams to prioritise the texts that they need to revise further as they move on to their final year of GCSE study.
